GRANTS SPOTLIGHT BY JOAN BRODY: FINISHING THE FY 23 GRANT SEASON STRONG AND THINKING ABOUT FY 24

By this time of year, I'm sure you have thought about applying for a lot of grants and may have even submitted a few applications. You will also notice that the pace of newly released grant solicitations is (thankfully!) slowing down. I know that grant deadlines are still coming up in the next four to six weeks, so don't let grant writing fatigue set in. Just remember, you will find out whether you won a grant award in only a few months, usually around September 30. Here are some last-minute tips to help you make it across the finish line while also building a strong foundation for FY24, which begins October 1, 2023.

Tip # 1: Read through the remaining grant solicitations listed on U.S. Department of Justice (DOJ) websites. These two website links below will contain most of the remaining FY23 grant funding opportunities:

If you have an internal grants working group, convene one last quick meeting to review remaining grant solicitations and identify any, even one, that might help you fulfill a need in your organization. And if you don't have an internal grants group, see Tip #2 below.

You can also send out an organization-wide email listing the selected final FY23 grant opportunities. I would ask a high-ranking member of your agency to forward your email through the chain of command so everyone knows your executive staff is supportive of this last push for new funding.



As the grant season winds down, naturally your grant writing energy may also be dropping. But maybe you will feel re-energized if you apply for a grant that may not receive as many applications. This will increase your competitiveness and your chance of winning an award.

Tip #2: Put together a list of internal subject matter experts who helped you with grants during the past few months. This is a quick and easy way to build the foundation for and launch an FY24 internal grants committee.

Next month, I will talk about developing a grant strategy to help you hone proactive grant-seeking approaches. A formal or informal internal grants committee will be key to helping you draft a grant strategy for applying for FY24 grants and implementing FY23 grant awards. Good Luck!

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
